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Travel Report – Georgia on my Mind: In November, we traveled to Atlanta to attend the retirement celebration of our friend Gideon who retired after 27 years in the Army. We sponsored Gideon 30 years ago when he immigrated to the U.S. from Cameroon. It was a wonderful party at the Hilton with military honors and speeches followed by a dinner of traditional Cameroon foods. Most of the attendees were from Cameroon or had connections to it. After the dinner there were many speeches and a Cameroonian ceremony honoring Gideon followed by traditional music and dancing. It was a



wonderful cultural experience for us and we were honored to have been included in the celebration.

Following the event, we set out to tour parts of Georgia and South Carolina that we had not seen before. We went from Atlanta to Savannah to Charleston, SC returning through Augusta, southern TN and Northern MS.
